

## The Inaka Project

~Share your slice of 'The Inaka' with others~

The Inaka Project, started by Christopher Allison, is a website featuring information on sightseeing hotspots, *onsen*, festivals and restaurants and famous foods found in the *inaka* (rural areas/ countryside) of Japan. Chris was kind enough to answer a few questions about his project for this issue.

- When did you start 'The Inaka', and what motivated you to start such a project?

I first came up with the idea for The Inaka in October of 2011, but didn't fully launch the site until late May 2012. The Inaka Project was started to solve three main problems I kept running into.

A. I wanted to give back to my Japanese community. I felt like the people here have given me so much, just wanted to do something to hopefully make their commun

much, just wanted to do something to hopefully make their community more prosperous, and bring more people to the town.

B. I was sick of not knowing what was out there. I found myself constantly looking online for stuff to do in specific cities and coming up empty. I could find lists of the best things to see and do in prefectures, or even find explanations of sights

in cities, but rarely could I find a tourism sight that focused on small towns and gave lots of pictures (which is what I wanted). For example if I looked for my town (Taketa), I would get some info on the castle in my town, but nothing on any of the other fifteen sites that are worth seeing. On top of that, the castle info included two poorly taken pictures and two pages of text. This is not good enough to bring in tourists.

C. I wanted to leave a good guide to my successor. I was dropped off in the middle of a city with no car, no Japanese, and no info on anything

around me. I did not want to leave my successor in a similar situation.

The Inaka Project started out as a site devoted to Oita Prefecture. What made you decide to expand the project to include all prefectures?

When I first started the site, I wasn't entirely sure what I was going to do with it. I knew I wanted to create a detailed guide to our prefecture, but wasn't sure how or what to do with it. Well,



one day I was in Kagoshima visiting my girlfriend, and we wanted to go to the sand baths down south. As nice as the sand baths sounded, we didn't think the bath alone was worth the two-hour train ride. We decided to look online for other things to do in the area... and looked... and looked some more. After about an hour or two of searching (even in Japanese) we just gave up and decided to go see a movie. It was at that time that I noticed it wasn't just Oita that needed a better travel guide: all of Japan could use one.

Can anyone contribute to The Inaka Project? If so, what sort of information can we contribute?

Yes anyone can contribute to the site. What we are looking for are:

1. Sights: Any attraction your city has to offer. Castles, Temples,

Parks, Anything

- 2. Restaurants: Mainly focusing on the smaller 'mom and pop' shops, but anything really.
- 3. Onsen: Self-Explanatory
- 4. Festivals: Self-Explanatory

You don't have to say a whole lot, but a brief description, a google map link, and as many pictures as you want to share, would be appreciated.

- Do you still plan to continue The Inaka Project now that you are back in America?

Yes. The Inaka has become something of a hobby of mine and I very much

want to continue the site even though I am in America.

- Do you have plans to come back to Japan in the future?

I love Japan and would like to go back as soon as possible. I am working an internship with Japan Healthcare Info. If I am able to land a full time position with them I may be in Tokyo soon enough. Japan Healthcare Info (JHI) works to help foreigners living in Japan with all of their health care questions. They also can help you find English speaking doctors.

In July 2012, Christopher Allison was named an Oita Prefecture Mejiron Overseas Supporter in a meeting with the Governor of Oita Prefecture for his fantastic work as both an ALT, and for promoting Oita Prefecture through The Inaka Project.

## Musings on Life in the City

~Cranes, undismissed anecdotes, and an invitation to dance~

- 1. I hear a familiar rhythm of sounds. It's a humming that I don't identify immediately, but it's altogether familiar as a sound backdrop to life in the city. You may have heard it or be hearing it now. I look down at the book I'm reading, then at the train tracks from the platform where I am seated. When my eyes move up slightly I see what is making the sound. Two brightly painted cranes are moving their mechanical arms and filling them up with torn metal remains of what was once the station. Structures that until fairly recently I knew as the city, are being torn down before my eyes.
- 2. A crane landed in a Japanese garden in the middle of the city. His wings were spread wide as he flew in from seemingly out of nowhere like a *tsuru* coming in for a landing from a Japanese *mukashi-banashi* story. He transported me deeper into the garden as the after-rain light glistened on lush urban greenery. We danced and were still and he introduced me to a girl who had a pretty name. One of her kanji was "Ath", the name of a fish in season. After the crane finally found what he was there for---lunch, in the form of a dragonfly swallowed whole-- he flew out as suddenly as he appeared. The girl and I drank green tea in a room with tatami floors and sliding doors and a woman in a kimono served us pastel colored *wagashi* shaped like *ayu*, the same fish in season that the girl was named after.
- 3. I am invited to observe what looks like a real life samurai drama or a Kurosawa movie. The cast of characters is seemingly the whole of Japanese culture, dressed in costume from an earlier period, maybe Heian... practicing some kind of formations in the middle of the night. They begin to line up around the outside of an open square space about the size of a football field's long side. It's all happening slowly and my friend Miyuki is called to practice her part in which she has to learn ninja-like spins from a woman whose head is detachable.

Once I wrote these anecdotes down I couldn't dismiss them. You know what Socrates says about thoughts... It may sound like nonsense, but you need to examine them and not dismiss them without due consideration if you have even the least bit of respect for yourself.

The first anecdote is from Oita Station. The second is a true story

(except the bird was a heron and not a crane) from when I was meditating in a Japanese garden in Fukuoka (Raku-sui-en); and the third is from my dream the other night.

At the end of the dream scene I realized I was still wearing a kimono that I apparently borrowed at the beginning of the dream. I passed by guards and through barricades to return to the hotel room where I was staying and saw in a mirror that the kimono was not exactly a kimono... it had a kimono feeling but was more suited to me. The low "V" shape of the neckline showed through to a t-shirt giving it a more casual and comfortable style, with a long skirt and patterns that both contrasted and went together like a real kimono and obi. The garment reminded me of a dress from my childhood that I'd borrowed to wear in a children's fashion show in a suburban department store, re-fitted and re-appearing after all these years for the dream.

When I looked inside a cup of green tea (in anecdote 2), I felt the whole universe was contained in its depth. When I saw one flower in a vase in the tokonoma alcove I understood that the flower was a reflection of me. The dream and the re-structured garment and the "old Japan" with the heron flying in and the "new Japan" with cranes tearing everything down all feel like messages or metaphors.

Could it be I am following those thoughts to see how the process---tearing down old structures (values, thoughts, ways of seeing the world and ourselves), and observing a new culture long enough can begin to bring us to fit into a garment (a life, a story) that is uniquely our own. Socrates was talking about self-knowledge and isn't that after all what we travel around the world to find?



#### LANGUAGE LEARNING PAGE



This section aims to teach new kanji characters to beginner-level Japanese learners, and to give intermediate and advanced learners a deeper understanding of each character. This month's character set is:

#### STORE MANAGER「店長」

The first character in the compound 「店」, is read as  $\vec{\tau} \overset{\text{re}}{\sim} \overset{\text{n}}{\sim}$ , or みせ. The character is a combination of roof 「广」, and hold/occupy 「占」. Together they symbolise a place where objects are held, ie. a shop.

#### SHOP「店」

The second character in the compound 「長」, is read as  $\mathcal{F}$ ョウ, or ながい. It is said to have come from a pictograph of a long haired person carrying a walking stick, and suggests a long passage of time.

#### LONG「長」

If we combine the characters for "store" and "long" we get the compound:

#### STORE MANAGER「店長」

The following sentence uses the above characters to exemplify their different readings.

あの顔の長い男性は、この店の店長です。

The man over there with the long face is the store manager of this shop.

#### Japanese Proverbs 塵も積もれば山となる

「ちりもつもればやまとなる」

"chiri mo tsumoreba yama to naru"

"Even dust will accumulate into a mountain" A stitch in time saves nine



#### Japanese Onomatopoeia

At the beach on a nice warm (ほかほか あたたかい pokapoka atatakai) day, I see a family holding a watermelon splitting contest. The mother puts the blindfold on the first child who swings at the watermelon, but misses completely (すかっ からぶり suka karaburi). The second child puts on the blindfold, walks quickly (すっすっと sussutto) over to the watermelon and hits it with a thwack (ピッシャリと pisharito) and splits the watermelon open (ぱっくり pakkuri) in one hit!

Back at the edge of the beach I get on my bicycle and cruise (すいすいと suisuito) along the path to the ice cream stand. I buy my ice cream, and it starts to melt straight away so I wolf it down (ガツガツ gatsugatsu). Looking across to the city, I see rain clouds and hear the rumbling (ゴロゴロ gorogoro) thunder of a summer storm. As I ride off, I can hear the leaves in the trees rustling (さやさや sayasaya) in the wind at the storm picks up.
