Noh Theatre (能)

'Klock...!' resonates the sudden sound of wood striking wood. A chorus of low humming voices erupts and then morphs gradually into a kind of cryptic wailing chant. As I strain my ears, attempting to decipher some of the short strings of syllabic puzzles, I realize that I cannot understand any of this Japanese. Like a mix between an esoteric mantra, and spiritual hymnal, the vibrations draw me into a state of relaxed meditation. 'Klock...!' again sounds the smooth piece of lacquered maple as its echo weaves a rhythm through the choir's melody. Soft amber light fills the room. I can feel my legs, folded beneath me, seiza style, beginning to lose feeling. 'Whack!' one, two, three...'whack!' The sharp slap of an unopened fan on a choir member's thigh awakes the male figure who has, all of this while, with his eyes cast down, been kneeling motionless in the center of the floor. A powerful rumble begins to grow from deep within him, while simultaneously, all but his own voice fade into silence. He comes to life, rises to his feet, and begins to walk, deliberately, but ever so slowly, and yet his feet glide across the floor. His mind, voice, and body move together in a simple, almost mechanical, but beautiful and controlled harmony.

-This is Miyamoto Shigeki, a master of Noh.

A number of months back I had the good fortune of being invited by one of my elementary school teachers to a Noh performance in Hiji town. To be quite honest, I at first considered politely declining Tanaka sensei's invitation because it happened fall on an evening on which I already had other plans. However, as she enthusiastically described a hobby of hers, Noh chanting, her eyes lit up and I could not help but feel her sincere desire to share a special part of Japan's traditional culture with me. She described to me how present day Noh embodies a fusion of religion and art, and how its adoption by the samurai class as a discipline influenced its character in profound ways. Anyone seeking to better understand the samurai, and Japanese culture, 'must study Noh,' she told me. Intrigued, I accepted her invitation. I thank my lucky stars that I did so, for that first live performance opened my eyes to a completely new facet of Japanese culture, and opened the door to some very special new friendships.

One characteristic that sets Noh's artistic form apart from many others is its attention to the absolute control of the body's movements. In Noh, at all times, 'no body parts are free to move freely. Like a wall, everything must be controlled.' Every muscle movement, voice fluctuation, every single breath is subjected to the strictest standards of regulation. 'No part of Noh is easy,' and this is perhaps one reason it became so suitable to the samurai class. The concentration and discipline required to sustain such complete control

over the body's movements can only be achieved after years of intense training and dedication. It is said that only then does one become able to manifest what lies at Noh's heart, *yuugen*, or that profound grace and subtlety that underpins the Japanese cultural aesthetic. Ultimately, like so many other elements of Japanese culture I have encountered, and revel in, Noh is something that undeniably deserves first-hand live experience.

I could not have guessed the deep impression that first experience would leave on me, or the new friendships that would grow out of Tanaka sensei's simple, yet sincere invitation to me, but as I watched Miyamoto Shigeki perform that first night, awestruck, I was touched by something that has deeply enriched my experience of this beautiful land and culture. How grateful I am to Tanaka sensei for reaching out and sharing with me her hobby.

Dance Walking Through the Seasons in Japan

In Japan there are all sorts of pleasures to look forward to in the fall, expressed as 'Shoku-yoku no Aki' (Hearty Appetite Fall), Undo no Aki (Sports Fall), Bunka no Aki (Culture Fall), and Dokusho-no-Aki (Read Books in Fall), to name a few. While there is still another exquisite month of southern Japan autumn to go, I would like to add another category to the mix--- Dansu no Aki!

As the red, brown, and golden leaves fall from the trees and spiral playfully with the autumn winds, what about dancing along with nature's twists and turns? Skip down a dirt path and feel the earth beneath your feet as you reach your arms to the blue skies and gather up that autumn light. Then, bring the light into

your body and let it radiate out through your heart and back into the world as you go!

At the beginning of this year (the year of the snake) I discovered the joys of Dance Walk, a combined form of exercise and expression that has even become my main form of transportation. I dance walked by the Oita River in January at the new moon, along Beppu Bay in the crisp February morning light, through a tunnel of Cherry Blossoms in March, with lotus blossoms in Usuki in the rainy season, and into the start of a local summer festival in July.

Dance walk is a way to explore new places in Japan, or wherever you are.

'Doko demo, dansu walkku!' (you can do dance walk wherever you are!) is a motto I came up with while waiting for a train in the rain with my video collaborator on the way back from a day trip

to Usuki to see the lotus blossoms (hasu-no-hana). We were giddy from the rain and a panku (flat tire) when I put on my iPod and started dancing on the platform to 'Drunk on Love' by Rihanna. By tuning into the music and my own inner rhythms, I began to see the lush green all around me, and the wonder of the moment. It is this awareness of connecting with our own flow and the world around us that attracts me to dance walk.

In the spring, the idea of going to Miyajima to do a dance walk 'floated' into my mind.

Miyajima is famous for its orange torii that appears to float in the sea at high tide, and is home to the

> Itsukushima Shrine, a World Heritage Site. When I got to the site and started the dance, it was like a dream come true. So many things from my 'Japan journey' came together, from a love of Japanese art and architecture that first attracted me to Japan, to the connection to water and tides (yoga dance which forms the basis of my dance walks is

based on the fluidity in the body and starts with moving from our 'inner oceans'); to the feel of the sand at low tide that reminded me in some way of the sandy beaches where I am from (yes, even this connection of Miyajima to Long Island is possible as we explore our own stories and connections!!).

At 5AM my video friend/collaborator and I were the only ones there between the shrine and the torii, before the incoming tides of sea and tourists began. At first I felt some intimidation and doubts when I stood

> there---how could I dance with a national treasure? But once I put my bare foot in the sand and turned on the music, I entered into a gesture of greeting with the torii that became the start of a day-long dance.

> We then watched the sun rise, 'danced' with deer, and rode bikes around the island, filming

where a group of tourists shared a dance with me! As the sea filled into the basin where I stood that morning on the dry sandy expanse, I felt gratitude and reverence for the majestic torii gate at Miyajima.
