# Worlds Collide: Europe Meets Oita

The "Sakoku Period" (1633-1866) refers to the over two hundred years the Edo shogunate in Japan practiced a policy of isolationism. Foreigners were not to enter Japan, and the Japanese were not to leave. Any potential violators of this law would be harshly punished. To Westerners who already viewed Japan as a mysterious land, this only served to make Japan seem more unknowable and secret. Although Japan re-opened to the world following the visit of Commodore Perry and his Black Ships and the subsequent Meiji Revolution in 1868, to this day, the image of Japan is a closed off and hidden away country still resonates strongly to those in the West. Japan is seen by many as a country that experienced limited cultural influence from Europe before the late 1800s, and it therefore often comes as a shock to visitors to Kyushu when they see signs of European contact with Japan throughout the region. The legacy of these interactions can be found almost everywhere on the island and this is particularly true in Oita.

When I first moved to Oita, one of the things that surprised me most were the statues of Christian missionaries dotted around Oita City. I was aware that the Dutch had been permitted to trade on Dejima, a small island in Nagasaki, even during the Sakoku Period. However, I had not given much thought to the influence of European culture in Kyushu before the Sakoku Period, nor had I thought that such cultural influence played such an interesting role in Oita's history. With the recent "Cultural Understanding Event: Holland" at the Oita International Plaza and OPAM's Dutch design exhibition, I thought it was the perfect time to explore Oita's historical links to Europe. Here is some trivia about Oita's history of interactions with Europeans before the Sakoku Period.

- Saint Francis Xavier, a Spanish missionary in the 1500s, is famous for traveling extensively in Asia. Xavier visited Oita as part of his mission to spread Christianity in Japan. There remain signs of Xavier in Oita today. You can find his statue in Oita City. You can buy a delicious Oita omiyage (snack) called a "Xavier." The little cakes were named in his honour and combine Japanese and European cake-making techniques.
- Ōtomo Sōrin served as the daimyō feudal lord of Funai, which is located in present-day Oita Prefecture, in the 1500s. Japan had many feudal lords during that period, but what differentiated Sōrin from many of his counterparts in other regions was his conversion to Catholicism following his meeting with Francis Xavier. It is said that his divorce second wife was due to her refusal to convert to Christianity.

• Visitors to the Sala de Usuki in Usuki City are greeted by an elaborate model of a large ship. This is a replica of the Dutch vessel de Liefde, which in the early 1600s ran into trouble in the shallow waters near Usuki. The crew were subsequently taken to Osaka, and this was one of the first interactions between Dutch traders and the Japanese. During the Sakoku Period, the only European nation permitted to trade with the Japanese on Dejima were the Dutch, meaning that the arrival of de Liefde in Usuki shows that Oita played an important role in Japan's early interactions with Europe.

• Did you ever wonder why Miyazaki Prefecture's famous chicken dish is called "chicken nanban"? Nanban is an old term referring to foreigners in Japan originating from Portugal and the goods that they brought with them to Japan. The Portuguese didn't invent chicken nanban, but the word nanban started to become affixed to dishes and products that had a foreign style or connection. The Portuguese also travelled to Oita Prefecture for trade or missionary work – and as a result nanban culture also flourished in Oita Prefecture.

Oita Prefecture is a treasure trove for anyone interested in history. Whether it is the ancient Buddhist relics in the Kunisaki Region, the beautiful Shinto shrines or samurai castles dotted throughout the region, or more modern historical artefacts such as those that can be seen on site of a Second World War airbase in Usa, there is something to interest all historians of Japan. I hope that this article has sparked people's interest in another fascinating aspect of Oita's history – its history involving Europe!


